SPEAKER WITHEM: So...so if in one year it would be 102 million dollars, then there's growth, the next year it could be 110 million and that's what we're doing here?

SENATOR ABOUD: It could be. It could be higher; it could be lower.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Yeah, conceivably it could be lower, yeah. Yeah.

SENATOR ABOUD: That's right.

SPEAKER WITHEM: It could be. I...hopefully, it won't be, but it could be. Okay. Yeah, this is another approach. It seems like we might have even, Senator Bohlke, did we deal with this issue of a percentage back on General File with this bill?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Withem, not only back on General File, but last year in Education Committee.
