SENATOR HARTNETT: Since you were trying to answer to Senator Maurstad I...fees from enterprise funds and operations. I had a question back...would you, under this enterprise functions or fees, would hot lunch programs be included in that aspect of an enterprise function? Did you...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I think that's outside. I think that's outside of the budget restrictions.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay, that was a question because it's self-serving and I guess if I listen to your...it's outside...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I think what Senator Maurstad was getting at was probably water and sewer I don't think you can make a profit on. I don't know about garbage, and certainly utilities people do.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yeah, yeah, I'm asking about a...I'm looking back to the school situation. If a school has a hot lunch program, it's self-supporting and they don't put any money, that's outside...or, Senator Warner, you're, you want to...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, Senator Hartnett, we believe that they were out before under the old system of...because as an enterprise, but now they are clearly out, not only because of that definition, but they are also out because of the...that revenue that they generate from the school lunch program is not a, is not part of the restricted funds, so whatever they collect and spend would be totally outside of any limitation.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yeah, okay. Thank you very much.
