SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And then that money will go into where account? Where will that end up? If...if they have to have, as part of a joint services, let's say law enforcement, is that...? If they are to have the ability to levy additional levy, that has to go for joint services, in this case, maybe law enforcement, for example?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And that's an additional source of county revenue.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And that goes into county coffers then?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: To fund, let's say a sheriff's department, perhaps.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And that's the only way that they could levy a county-wide sales tax, is to have some kind of joint services or can this be done this?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, that's right. They're going to be restricted and I'm just making sure I've got my notes. The proceeds from that tax can only be used to finance the county share of that joint commission or that joint service...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Oh, okay.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...that they do. You're not going to be
