SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, it's only...it's...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Only if they put in their five percent, right...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: It's...

SENATOR ROBINSON: ...on their interlocal agreement? Isn't there a interlocal agreement where they have to put five cents in for the...?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: The most that the county can get is five cents. Okay?

SENATOR ROBINSON: You're...are you saying the county puts it in or the...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, the most that's there is each are allowed that nickel...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...to go to do the county/city public safety, the joint thing. You'll have to have an interlocal agreement.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay. Now, is it all...does the sales tax go in there, too, if they have one?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: The county can use their sales tax proceeds to fund their portion of the interlocal agreement.
