SENATOR MAURSTAD: I'll waive.

SENATOR CROSBY: Waives closing. The question is the adoption of the Maurstad amendment to LB 1276. All in favor vote aye, opposed no. Record, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on Senator Maurstad's amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Senator Maurstad would move to amend with 4118.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: I would withdraw that amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Senator Beutler would move to amend. (FA581 is found on page 1519 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Crosby, members of the Legislature, this is relatively a minor amendment also. This bill is, in my opinion, at least, is a very good bill, but it is also a very aggressive bill from the point of view of those who operate museums in terms of providing for some very aggressive features in terms of resolving unclaimed property or undetermined ownership of property, various questions like that. All my amendment does is cut out a couple of ambiguities in the bill in the interest of restoring a little more balance to property owners. It strikes Section 7, which has to do with property whose ownership is from a source unknown and might reasonably be assumed to have been intended to be a gift. The reason for striking Section 7 is that I think that those kinds of properties, to the extent that they have any value, can be dealt with under Section 5 and those procedures which set out some notices of Section 5 and those procedures dealing with undocumented property, which I assume is the same as saying
