SENATOR LYNCH: Yeah, well I...

SENATOR LYNCH: Oh. When I asked you if that was possible again, I got the impression, to be completely frank, that you understood the issue, number one; and, secondly, it couldn't happen again because you had stricken that section, where you showed me earlier. But I'm still on my time. That kind of concerns me with this issue. Are we revisiting that kind of an issue with this kind of language, however it might apply? We had an earlier talk also about federal income tax laws and how they apply, and how we're all affected by them, how we can't change them here at the state level. But the discussion that was raised by Senator Wickersham, as it applies to this law, and I know we're talking about income tax law and we're talking about the possibility of how the principal behind this legislation and others previously passed are being merged. But the more I listen, the more I think that is certainly not inappropriate, because I have serious concerns. You know, I committed, I think this is good to support something like this. But I don't want to be snookered again. I don't want to be that lay person on the block who wants to leave the impression we want to help keep these jobs and get this company here, but I don't want to start a system again that offers an opportunity for some people to take advantage of something without our knowing it. And you know if the introducer of the legislation is not for sure if that's happening or not, and he wasn't sure if, in fact, the experience we had with Micron and the alcohol plant took place, or how it took place, then I am starting to have concerns about the language because this is a very complicated bill. I want to support something that will help keep these jobs in companies. But I'm not going to read something on this floor that's given to me by lobbyists about why we ought to do something. You know, deep in your heart, you get a gut feeling once in a while. Sometimes those of us who maybe don't understand as significantly as some others do this kind of language have gut feelings. My gut feeling right now is that I wish I understood what in fact we're talking about and why...what is it? Why would it be a...why would the Wickersham
