He's been very patient in I think trying to understand what some of us feel will be an impact with 1375 and how that could affect different people and worked very hard to see that if we can try to cover all bases. A little bit of an explanation of why I have some concerns with 1375 is it's been over a year ago I had a county official come to me who is very aggressive and very knowledgeable when it comes to the GIS system on a county level and say, Senator Hillman, we have a real problem in that the county has some concerns as when we get ready to distribute information because we have people clamoring for it, what is it that we can do as far as charges and dealing with the open records law? And in his research, there was really no federal policy, especially in the areas of electronic. There was not many states that were working on anything. Colorado was doing a little bit and didn't know exactly what to do. In the interim, they have gone ahead and they have developed a system whereby there's public and private, there are other government entities involved. They've done things with charges as far as those that have participated, their charges are less, those that offer information, those that don't, how it's going to be needed. And they have some real concerns about what that will mean if somebody would challenge it. And so first and foremost I think it's very timely and it's very important that the state address what it is that we're going to be charging in the area of public records. Now for me it's not simple, but yet it's simple from the point that I believe that tax money have collected all the information. And the state
