SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Wehrbein, to discuss the advancement of LB 1213A.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, Mr. Speaker. No discussion. I just wanted to call the body. I see it was reduced significantly. I appreciate that. Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Pirsch, do you have closing? Closing, I assume is waived. The question is, shall LB 1213A be advanced? All in favor vote aye. Opposed vote nay. Record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 1213A.

SPEAKER WITHEM: LB 1213A advances. Mr. Clerk, LB 1306.

CLERK: LB 1306, a bill by Senator Kristensen. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 18 of this year, referred to Transportation, advanced to General File. I do have committee amendments pending by Transportation, Mr. President. (See AM3211 found on page 830 in the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Kristensen, on the committee amendments.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. LB 1306 is the Transportation bill dealing with the administration of Nebraska motor vehicle laws. What we're doing is adding new language into the motor vehicle section here that talks about the term "certificate of title", and that that's going to include the term "salvage certificate" or "a salvage certificate of title", or any other document of ownership by another state for a salvaged vehicle. And here's what occurs, and, quite frankly, the committee amendment just clarifies this. And there are certain states, if I remember right, Texas, California, Illinois, issue what's called a salvage certificate. Now when you come to the state of Nebraska to get...and you get a salvage title here, our Department of Motor Vehicles has got an interpretation that they don't recognize a document called a salvage certificate.
