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case on that. But, Senator Dierks, you can have my time if there's any left.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you. Do I have some time left, Senator Withem?

SPEAKER WITHEM: There's a minute left.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you. Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Withem and members of the Legislature, the requirements at the time that Mrs. Hansen joined the union did not include the windows and when she asked to have her dues...when she asked to resign and when she asked to have her dues taken out, the windows were not in effect. Windows came in after that. And this is what the Attorney General and the Ombudsman have based their...and the Auditor have based their opinions on, that her actual membership form did not have anything on it considering...concerning windows, so she could, in effect, resign whenever she wanted to. The windows came in after and she resigned before windows were installed, and yet that wasn't honored even then. Her union card never had said anything about windows. That's why she didn't resign when the windows thing came up 'cause she'd already resigned, and what she thought was an effective resignation. So...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Time.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Dierks. I'd like to recognize guests of Senator Elmer. We have 41 juniors and seniors from Eustis and Farnam in the north balcony, along with their teacher. Could you stand and be recognized, please. Senator Witek, followed by Senators Hudkins, Abboud, Beutler, and Vrtiska.

SENATOR WITEK: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I wonder, Senator Abboud, if you could answer just a question for me. I was not here on the prior discussion on this and I don't know if I have to pay for legal advice for this question, but if this lady wanted these dues back and she wanted to...I don't understand why they came to the Claims Court instead of going into a courtroom situation. Would she...she has to pay for her own lawyer, right, to do that in a courtroom
