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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, the Appropriations Committee made the commitment last year to 75 percent last year to move to 80 percent this year. The 80 percent was vetoed last year. We did not override. This year we did vote to put it in to the 80 percent level.

SENATOR JANSSEN: It was...it was over...it was not overridden last year then.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: No, we did not seek to override it.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. That...I believe the commitment was there then that we go ahead and fund it with what we had on line. Is that right?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. All right, thank you. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. This is an area, my colleagues, that we have to be very compassionate about. These are people, as Senator Lynch said, that have no one else to turn to but this institution we're dealing in right now. There isn't enough, I don't believe there is enough that we can...that we can help to support these people that work in these institutions. I...and the people that are in them deserve every break they can get. We can...you know, you can walk around out here and we set our own destinies, but these people cannot do that. They're locked into one category and there's no help available for them other than what we can...that we can try to...try to help with. It's a sad situation when we start turning our back on these people, and I commend the Appropriations Committee for coming forward with the proposal they do have and I am going to vote against Senator Avery's amendment. I'm sure he has...you know, I commend him for trying to do what he think is right, but I think we've turned our back enough and in the past few years on these people and they need all the support we can give them. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senators. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Question.
