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between six and eight. So I guess...

SENATOR JANSSEN: So you really aren't going to change a lot then, are you?

SENATOR WESELY: Well, I...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well you have got six regions now, right?

SENATOR WESELY: Well it depends. Again there are several different systems, some have six, some have eight, so you're unifying them and consolidating some of them and I think reducing some of that cost and thus also streamlining some of the decision-making process, instead of having a multitude of check points, to try and bring all the pieces together. You just can't...

SENATOR JANSSEN: But you know I remember last year, I believe it was, when we were talking about changing some of the regions around. You remember the people that came into that hearing...

SENATOR WESELY: Yeah, I remember.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...and I think half of Dodge County was there. There are concerns, you know, there are concerns that they are used to going to a certain area and anything that would change this...and they are afraid that there are some gray areas, they don't know where they are at. They don't know what is going to be happening to them.

SENATOR WESELY: Absolutely. Let me tell you that the idea of the changes isn't on the terms of the service, where they go for service, it is the administrative structure that I am aiming at, that middle man in a sense that we have got a little bit of a problem with duplication. But, for the person that is down there, the consumer, the recipient of services, they are going to go to the same people. It is just a question of who oversees them and pays their bills. But for the person on the street who got concerned, like you said, I think they have got some bad information about how it would actually impact them. It really won't impact the service end of it. It is in between that we have a problem.
