I'd remind you that we have, for an example, a different system, the Daktronics system here in the Clerk's desk. So...and then it also provides \$25,000 for a contract with C/S Builders, which is a California consultant, that has helped us put together the prototype system that I think everyone has had a chance to look at. So, again, I would emphasize that if the Exec Board decides not to go ahead, then this money would, of course, lapse back, and with that I would ask for the adoption of this amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Madam President. Senator Coordsen, a couple of questions right quick.

SENATOR VRTISKA: First of all, I'll make a statement. Once I built a house and they told me what it was going to cost, and when it ended up, it cost about a half again as much, and I am worried about since you can't give us very exact figures...

SENATOR COORDSEN: I think anything that's put in place after 1990, I believe that's taken care of.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand that.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: The only real.. real serious question that I would like to pose to you and that is, can you give any estimate at all about how many dollars it cost now to put these things together as opposed to what it would cost to put that so we could talk about the projection of savings.
