SENATOR CROSBY: Okay. That's what Senator Schellpeper was saying. Senator Kristensen, could you help me out just a little? I want to be sure I'm on Article VIII, is that right, Article VIII in the constitution, Revenue?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Kristensen, would you respond?

SENATOR CROSBY: And then Section 1 down to number (4) is what, the agricultural and horticultural land is a separate and distinct class of property, right?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Right. That Article sets out that property's got to be uniformly and...

SENATOR CROSBY: Okay.

SENATOR CROSBY: So you can help me with the second half of Senator Schrock's amendment where he says real property is not...shall not exceed more than 100 percent of value. That means our homes, our business, what?
