

the argument that say that it might be an imagined advantage that one sector of the economy gets protected constitutionally that others don't, that's there also. I think we would be better off, even if some of you that supported this amendment think it is good policy, this time, and typically I don't argue people to reconsider just for the sake of reconsidering, but I think that this is as important an issue as we have dealt with this session, as important a set of issues as we have dealt with in a long time in this Legislature, and I do think the Schrock amendment endangers that. I know Senator Schellpeper made the point that this Legislature won't have the last say on this. Senator Schellpeper, if 29 or fewer senators vote for this, that will be the last say on this constitutional amendment. The citizens won't get a chance to vote on it. Senator Warner has told you the importance of 292. What this motion of mine does very simply is it just places us back in time with the Schrock amendment pending, and urge you, if there is any doubt in your mind about the potential impact of this on everything else, that you at least give the vote to reconsider at this point. With that, Senator Warner may have the remainder of my time, if he so chooses.

SENATOR WILL: Senator Warner, you have two minutes.

SENATOR WARNER: Thank you, Mr. President. I'd just urge the body to consider seriously to reconsider this. I think the amendment is far more far-reaching in terms of its potential constitutional effect beyond what we initially talked about, and, frankly, ought to be done with a lot of careful thought, and I would hope that you would take it off and look at the full ramifications, should this kind of provision be locked into the constitution, and how that will limit you in the future.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you. You have heard the closing. The question before the body is a reconsideration of the adoption of the Schrock amendment. Senator Withem.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Just I am going to ask for a call of the house and a roll call vote in regular order.

SENATOR WILL: The question is, shall the house come under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. Mr. Clerk, please record.
