Those people who would need that 25 cent an hour increase are not on his agenda nor on the agenda of most of the members of the Legislature,...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...so that issue will never be considered this session as it ought to be. He knows this. He's probably in what is called the catbird seat more than any other person on the floor of this Legislature. I know that my job is going to be hard, Senator Hillman, because the Scriptures say, the way of the transgressor is hard. And I do transgress against those things that the rich, the highborn, the oppressors want to see done. And I continually work against those things and I will continue to continually do so. I am opposed to the advancement of this bill and I'm going to see how many will vote for it. And I love to have the roll called, so when that time comes for the vote I'm going to ask for a call of the house and a roll call vote.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Chambers, you may continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, thank you, Madam President and members of the Legislature. To be in such demand (laughs) that I am told to please...well, actually, I'm kind of editing. I'm adding a little bit. But to continue, this bill has been called the centerpiece of the so-called tax relief package. Now when Senator Schrock's amendment was on that bill, the amendment did not change anything, Senator Janssen, in any of those bills, didn't change anything in them, did not change anything about 292, but they got you to change your vote. Your change surprised me. Some of the others didn't because they talked to me after committee hearings, you know, and they're all deep into this ag thing and this rural thing, but they're about as
