SENATOR LINDSAY: That, I don't know. I do know that the...Corrections believes it would be less expensive than building a facility of comparable size.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Now, just...just to clear my own mind, this type of facility, are you talking of a facility that would be somewhat like the, to use Senator Chambers' words, Quonset that they're building, that type of facility, that would be open and...

SENATOR LINDSAY: No, this...

SENATOR VRTISKA: This would be more of a confined facility?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Right.

SENATOR VRTISKA: And you're talking about for youth?

SENATOR LINDSAY: No, this is for...primarily for use as the...for the chemical treatment ..

SENATOR VRTISKA: Oh, okay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: ...chemical abuse treatment...

SENATOR VRTISKA: And...

SENATOR LINDSAY: ...which is currently housed over at Air Park.

SENATOR VRTISKA: My last question then is, how does it...how many do you anticipate it would accommodate?

SENATOR LINDSAY: I'm thinking 100, but I'm going to have to double check that for you.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay. Okay. I appreciate those answers. I...I just need some clarification. I'm sure we'll get...we'll hear more so, with that, Mr. Speaker, I thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Pedersen. Senator Pedersen.

SENATOR PEDERSEN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, my understanding is...Senator Lindsay, I'm going to ask you a
