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property and we should be up in that 60-65 percent being paid for by other sources other than property. States around us seem to be able to manage, but we don't want to look at what states around us do because it...it impairs our thinking process. Never mind what Iowa or Kansas or South Dakota or Colorado do, we don't want to be like them. We want to be a high property tax state. So I'll be voting for the Abboud amendment. I'll try not to take too much of your time. But, Chris, I give you a lot of credit...or, Senator Abboud, I give you a lot of credit for bringing this forward and hang in there.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Question.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The question's been called. Are there five hands? I see five hands. The question before you is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? The question before you is, shall debate cease? Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Madam President. I'll ask for a call of the house and I'll accept call-ins.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: There's been a request for a call of the house. All those...Senator, we are in Final Reading.

SENATOR BOHLKE: I'm sorry.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senators just need to check in.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Will senators check in please. The question before you is, shall debate cease? We are accepting call-in votes. Senator Beutler, Senator Brashear, Senator Chambers, Senator Robinson, Senator Schimek, Senator Cudapack. Senator Warner, Senator Wesely, Senator Janssen, and Senator Kristensen.

CLERK: Senator Brashear voting yes.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Please record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 3 nays, Madam President, on the motion to cease
