

SENATOR BROMM: And the size of their office and... No, I would not...I would not disagree that any senator could have every bit as much to contribute as a chairperson of one of these committees.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Here's what I will ask then, Senator Bromm. You would not take it as a slam against you or the work that you've done if I would attempt to get the Legislature to strike these specific designations and leave it to the Exec Board and if it turns out that these people are the ones who happen to be selected then I would accept that.

SENATOR BROMM: That would not bother me at all. I would like to see the representatives of other political subdivisions, I'd like to see that language retained because we did spend some time talking with people who are interested in this subject who certainly want to be represented.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, for my purposes, that wouldn't have to be touched.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So I would come down through subsection (6) for striking and then leave (7) that says "Five representatives of political subdivisions" and all the rest of that.

SENATOR BROMM: And for my part I would not have a problem with that. I don't know how Senator Withem or Senator Janssen, of course, might feel, but I don't have any problem with that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, my light is on and before I undertake to do it I'm going to ask Senator Withem and Senator Janssen,...

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ..because it may be good to retain the chairperson of the Executive Board as the chairperson of the task force just for convenience. You know, that would kind of give us a starting point so we could declare that to be the way we would go. And then I will talk to you to see how many total senators you want because here I think there would be seven or six. That's all I have now, Mr. President.
