PRESIDENT ROBAK: Debate ceases. The Chair recognizes Senator McKenzie to close on the amendment.

SENATOR MCKENZIE: Thank you, Madam President. I would like to yield the first part of the close to Senator Dierks.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Madam Lieutenant Governor and members of the Legislature. I just wanted to speak to the Chairman of the Natural Resources District for a moment in closing, Natural Resources Committee, I'm sorry. Senator Beutler, when we send legislation like this over to the agencies to have it developed, they develop their own rules and regulations. And I am hoping that the Natural Resources Committee and the Chairman of the committee is going to have a tremendous amount of oversight on those rules and regulations as they come out of that body to make sure they are following exactly what our wishes are here on this legislation today and tonight. I would hope that that would be part of your charge that this would take place. And, with that, I want to thank Senator Bohlike for her actions and Senator McKenzie, because they have done a lot to provide the impetus to get this done tonight.
