SENATOR WARNER: ...those of you who were involved in that amendment made a significant improvement in a policy, but I would...I am going to support the advancement and the passage of the bill, but I don't consider this as a...by any mark, as a big drastic change in direction of policy, but of relative fine tuning of a policy that the body established a year ago.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Lynch. The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All in favor vote aye, opposed no. SENATOR LYNCH: Reluctantly but necessarily, I think we should have a call of the house, please.

SENATOR CROSBY: The house is under call. Would all senators please record your presence. Would those out of the chamber please return and record your presence. Senator Lynch. Thank you. We're voting on whether to cease debate, and Senator Lynch has indicated he will accept call-in votes.

CLERK: Senator Avery voting yes. Senator Robinson voting yes.

SENATOR CROSBY: Record, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate.

SENATOR CROSBY: Debate does cease. I'm going...we will...I'll leave the call and, Senator Brashear, you are recognized to close on LB 1368.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Madam Chair, members of the Legislature, while I'm certainly not unappreciative of Senator Maurstad's comments, I agree with Senator Chambers. He's right in fact; I respectfully suggest wrong in substance. LB 1368 commends
