

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But it...if we did that, it would not create an unlawful allowance? That's the question that I think...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, you...you get into...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Senator Brashear might be asking.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: You get into the issue of tax situs. In other words, where should the car be housed? For the people that are coming in to get a plate, you know, they may not...yeah, the car's got to be here, but they may be doing it for the wrong purposes because they have...they don't want their car registered in another state.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Uh-huh.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I don't know if that's good policy to reward or encourage those people to get a spirit plate. I don't know that there are going to be that many of those types of people. Perhaps the larger one may be Senator Hartnett's people who are on the military base.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then I would ask Senator Hartnett the question. Senator Hartnett, does it make any difference to you if they are not allowed to apply since they would not take Nebraska as their state of residence?

SENATOR HARTNETT: I can't speak...speak...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, let me ask it a different way. Would you want those people to be able to apply for these plates if they're stationed at Offutt, even though they claim their home state as their place of residence, like that's where they would vote, and things like that? So although they're living in the state, their residence is someplace else.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Or someplace else. Yeah, and your amendment would not allow them to get...is that as I understand?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, it would allow them. The way the bill is now, they couldn't apply for these plates.

SENATOR HARTNETT: And your amendment...and your amendment would allow them to?
