be to have any money derived from these plates go to a scholarship fund, but other concessions had to be made. Allowing those concessions to continue to exist, I would still like to see a yearly pay over into that fund of 10 percent and it's ongoing. The money that would be used for scholarships would come from the income of this amount that we're putting into this fund, and the corpus...the fund...the money itself will not be spent for the scholarships, only the income. So the more money in that fund, the better it would be.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And at some point, it may provide the basis for doing additional things for these athletes which the NCAA, in my opinion, will be compelled to allow. So when the money goes in the fund, it's not going to be taken out for stipends at this point or anything else, only the scholarship. That's the amendment I would offer, so it means that I'll be opposing Senator Bernard-Stevens' equalization amendment. But the only one before us right now is to add the undergraduate work as a basis for a former athlete receiving these funds. And I hope you'll adopt that amendment.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. Chairman, members of the body, just briefly, we've talked about so many different amendments and so many different items on this amendment, I just wanted to rise and urge adoption. This is a compelling, important amendment by Senator Chambers. It truly would be tragic if it were not adopted in relationship to what the athletes contribute, and I urge the addition of these...this undergraduate status as a factor. Thank you.
