SENATOR BROMM: That's correct.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: So in effect there wouldn't be any other electronic access because nobody would do it because they'd lose money doing it. In effect, that record won't occur now.

SENATOR BROMM: I wouldn't agree with that assessment, but you could, you know, you can make that argument. I don't agree.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: You know, I don't want to take your time, Senator.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, and I just want to kind of skirt through there. The other part is on the second page, Senator Bromm, when it says the report shall include but not be limited to. When you say "not be limited to" that means there's a wide variety of things that could be put into that report. Is that language necessary?

SENATOR BROMM: The "not be limited to" language?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR BROMM: Not as far as I'm concerned. If they wanted to provide something else that was relevant that they felt the Exec Board should consider or know, the intent is that they would not be prohibited from including other information in that report.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay.

SENATOR BROMM: It isn't to suggest that they have to provide a lot more than...these are the essentials basically.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Is that when it says "but not be limited to," is that a direction to the Exec Board or is that a direction to the person submitting the report?

SENATOR BROMM: I think it's a direction to the person submitting the report.
