But my mild little amendment doesn't go to all of those issues. It just clarifies this amendment and makes sure that it states that which is factually correct.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Janssen announces that the following guests are visiting the Legislature. There are 37 fourth graders here from Washington/Davenport Elementary School in Fremont with their sponsors. They are in the north balcony. Will you all stand and be recognized, please. Welcome to the Legislature. Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, this is a time when wise people remain silent. Yeah. Let all the big dogs bark and every puppy takes hold. If this agreement hadn't been arrived at, this compact with Satan, this agreement with Hades, that's a paraphrase of what William Lloyd Garrison said about the constitution because it protected slavery and the slave trade. I like to throw a little historical illusions to broaden our scope and give depth to our discussion here. But you know why everybody is quiet? Because what I'm talking about is embarrassing. We got fine big shots outside the glass with whom you all are going to deal, with whom you all will eat, with whom you all will work on other issues so you don't want me to talk like I'm talking. So everybody else is going to be quiet and I don't really mind because this is the end of the session and usually this is a point at which, Senator Coordsen, I would be talking at length anyway. But I have a more focused aim at this point. And if there are no questions, then I will take a vote on this amendment. But here again is what the amendment does, my amendment. It will remove language which seems to give the impression that a contract that calls for a fee in excess of what is allowed under state law can be entered into. To make sure that I am correctly reading the amendment that I'm trying to offer an amendment to, I'd like to ask Senator Bromm a question.
