

contract, including, at least, those items which are enumerated in Section 4 including the security, the fees, and so forth. You know, I don't have a problem with clarifying that, if it needs to be, but it seems to me that if you read the sections together that that is what we are saying. And I...so I guess I'm always willing to improve something, if there is a way to improve it. Senator Hillman has a problem with it, I have said what our intent is, and I will stick with that intent, so if there are words that need to be massaged, I think I could change a few words in Section 4 in very short order and solve the problem, if we need to do it. I have got it written out here, which I would be willing to talk to Senator Beutler about it, if I need to, and Senator Hillman. I wanted to just make a couple of other comments before I forgot them. When Senator Brashear made his comments about rewarding creativity and rewarding privatization, it tweaked me a little bit in terms of something that I think...that I think we need to say here. We're not saying to an agency if you have an idea don't pursue the idea. We are not saying that. We are saying this, that if your idea encroaches upon or subverts or is contrary to the practice that's been followed in this state, and in this instance, the practice has been the Legislature sets the fees for public documents that are necessary for people to have, necessary for people to have, whether it be driver's license records, whether it be certified copies of the Secretary of State's records. We have had the domain and the responsibility for setting those fees. We have had significant discussions on the floor arguing over a quarter or 50 cents because when you magnify that over a year and over several years, it amounts to a substantial amount of money. It's not...if you say we are stifling creativity or privatization, I think that's not the point here. That's not the point. The process that was followed is a major part of the point, and Senator Chambers has enumerated on that. I share his feelings on that, but I'm willing to accept this resolution so we can move forward. I also have a question for Senator Kristensen, if I have time. Senator Kristensen.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR BROMM: Isn't it correct that when you need a birth certificate or a death certificate, you generally need a certified copy for the purposes that you need it for?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, that's not necessarily true.
