

recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. You've heard Senator Bromm's question about the...about selling the public records. I think it gets down to the issue of are we or are we not selling those records. I think it's a question...there is a question about providing the access. Clearly, when you allow somebody to come in by modem and look at that record, download a copy of the record, not the record itself. That record itself stays in the computer into which you are gaining access, or if you walk, physically walk into an office and request a photocopy of a record, the record itself stays in that office. So I don't think we are selling public records, although with this it's allowing, in Section 4, anyway, the agency desiring to sell public records simply needs to follow this process, and the question is, is that going beyond what we even have now? Is it going beyond what the intent is of the sponsors of the bill, a bill which, by the way, I support and I don't want to do anything to keep it from getting passed, but I have a concern about whether we are authorizing something that we don't intend to authorize, and that I am not comfortable with the concept of selling a public record. And so with that, I'd urge that the amendment be adopted.

SPEAKER WITHEM: You've heard the closing. The question now then is the adoption of the Lindsay amendment. All of those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. We are voting on the adoption of the Lindsay amendment. Have you all voted? Have all of you wishing to vote voted? Mr. Clerk. Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Mr. President, I'd ask for a call of the house and accept call-ins.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The question before the body is, shall the house go under call? All of those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record.
