

involved in that. I think mine would be.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Yes, Madam President and members. Senator Lindsay is right, the two bills were not heard at the same time because we had too many bills the first day. But neither bill came out of the committee until both bills were heard, until we were all through with the hearings, and then LB 1088 was compromised with the retailers, with the wholesalers and with the manufacturers. We were not able to do that with LB 910. They wanted it as is. They weren't able to work it out. They wanted it that way, and so that's why 1088 came out and LB 910 did not. But neither bill came out until after we heard the hearing on both of them, because we planned on taking the two bills and putting them together. But they go in two opposite ways and we couldn't work it out between everyone involved, so we couldn't do that. That's why the one bill came out of the committee, the other one did not. As far as suspending the rules, if Senator Landis has the votes, I think it's a bill right now that is compromised enough, everybody has agreed to it, except Senator Lindsay and his client, but everybody else has agreed to it. It's something that they can live with, it's something that is workable, and something that will happen without a lot of uproar. And I think it's something will also help the brewpubs that are out there. So if the body wants to suspend the rules, they have a bill, 1088, I think that can go forward and that will help the brewpubs in this state. If they don't, then we'll go on to something else. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I rise in support of the suspension of the rules and in support of the Landis amendment for probably several reasons. One is I have several brewpubs in my district, which have been very successful, and which I think have a good idea here. Secondly, I had occasion, a number of years ago, to visit some relatives over in Switzerland, in a little village, and they owned a brewery in that little town. And it was a very small brewery that just had a very small distribution, several car tons right in that immediate area. As well as that in this
