

this restriction on buying kegs would turn around, two years later, and lift it in a bill that they may not have even been aware at the time that we voted for the suspension that was in here. I hope that we're all taking, you know, a hard look at either removing this section from the bill and allowing it to just be a discussion on the brewpubs issue, which those of you who want to have a discussion on that, feel free to do so. But I would hope that at the very least that we remove this section from the bill and not, I would urge you not to get rid of this restriction on buying kegs. I have a teenager and I know. I'm right there, I'm a mother who's right there and knowledgeable about what is going on in the high schools in this...look at the kids in Columbus! My God, that happened, what, a couple weeks ago. You know, kids are drinking and they're driving and it will happen, and it has always happened. But let's not make it any easier, let's make it tough. And I'm sorry the paperwork is tough. You know, I'm sorry somebody has to sign their name on a registration piece of paper in order to get a keg, but they'll get over it. That takes five minutes of their time. How much time do these four kids, who ended up in a lake, have left, and their families that are torn apart? I would urge you not to rescind this registration for these kegs, because you know and I know that a lot of these parties coming up, a lot of parties year-round have kegs in them. I've been there, I've seen it. It's been in my neighborhood. My children may be at one. I mean I'm not saying...I'm not saying it's somebody else's kids and not mine, I never do that. I came from a large family and I know who's involved in a lot of these things. And a lot of people who are at parties, they just happen to fall into a lot of these things because it's available, because it's there, because someone has provided that keg. And I want to know who provided that keg, I want to be able to trace that keg. That's why we put it into law two years ago, we wanted to be able to trace that keg, find out who bought that keg so that we could hold someone responsible for the minors who were drinking at that, because we couldn't trace it any other way, there wasn't a law before that. And if there's a problem with the actual law, then let's have a hearing on it, let's put in a bill, let's talk about it, let's try to fix it, but let's not rescind it here and almost the last day of session, I think that's very poor policy and very bad timing. And I would urge you not to...not to adopt this amendment, at least as long as this language is in here, this throwing out of this language. I want to know who buys these kegs. I want to make it tougher to buy these kegs. I
