

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: It would...the real impact would take...we would feel the impact when?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: The impact, there will be a small decrease in '96-97. The major impact will hit in...now in '97-98. What you have on your fiscal note is delayed a year. That's the point.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay, and I don't have that fiscal note right in front of me. The '97-98 impact will be what?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Four hundred and sixteen thousand, five hundred and ninety-nine dollars.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay. Okay. I got you now. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Is there any further discussion of the Wehrbein amendment? Seeing none, Senator Wehrbein to close.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I'm going to make a correction, if I can. I had...the '96-97 amendment will be 33,000. The '97-98 will be 259,000, so it's less than I told you. And then in 1998-99 it will be 658,000, so it's significant, but it's delayed, but it isn't quite the same figures I gave you. This is updated. With that, I will close.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Wehrbein, was that your closing?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Okay. Seeing...having closed, the question before you is the adoption of the Wehrbein amendment to LB 33. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of Senator Wehrbein's amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Wehrbein amendment is adopted. There anything further on the bill?
