SENATOR LINDSAY: Oh, I...and I think...how long would it take, I disagree with you as far as how it would get there...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Senator Chambers, you may continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you can continue, Senator.

SENATOR LINDSAY: We have to look at, if you look at the opinion itself, the Supreme Court, if the Supreme wants to, Court wants to strike this down, they're going to do it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: And you and I both know that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: But, and they don't need a case on point to do it. Metro Renovations case, that was an unemployment dispute, or a Department of Labor dispute, that had nothing to do with precedent. They just kind of came out of the...just came out and said this is the way it's going to be and caught everybody by surprise. So if they want to do it, they can come right out and do it. And you're right to that extent, there's nothing we can do to stop them. But by the same token, where I think you and I disagree is that I don't think it hurts anything to include it and you think it...and I think you think it does hurt to include it. And I think that's where the disagreement is.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Lindsay, since this is the last chance I can speak on this, but I am going to speak on the motion to advance if I don't get it finished, and I probably won't, because I want a record, and I want to separate myself from what the Legislature is doing.
