

critical funding shortages, you will wish you had this 6 million plus back. And we'll wonder where we're going to get the dollars. Well, this is one place that you can save aside for a while, \$6 million. Or, if you want to rephrase it another way, pass this one. Maybe the Governor will sign it. But he'll take 6 million out somewhere else. Where do you want it taken out of? And are those areas that the Governor would take it out of a lesser priority than this one? And we all say when we come to spending it finally comes to the crunch of priorities, here we are, it's not tomorrow, it's not handing it back to the Governor and saying, let him decide, it's our priorities now on our spending. And, again, I would urge, because I think we are going to have higher priorities and I think this is one that would be nice to do if we had the dollars to do so, but we don't now, particularly with what we're going to do on property tax, political subdivisions, and schools, I don't think this is the time that we can say, here's \$6 million, you deserve it, and it's not going to have any effect down the line of a higher priority because it will. And I would urge the body not to advance 106 at this time. And, Madam President, I withdraw the motion.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The motion is withdrawn. Anything further on the bill?
