

and that's natural. It's natural with any large change, but this is the final large change in water policy. This is what brings water policy altogether into a coherent whole in Nebraska. And 10, 15, 20 years from now when your children ask you, where were you and what did you do on the day this was voted upon, I think you're going to want to say, I voted for 108. Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Dierks, there are no further lights on, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to just withdraw the amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: It is withdrawn. Mr. Clerk, anything else?

CLERK: Nothing further, Mr. President.
