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Kristensen, but I hope that you will adopt this provision of the rules, this change, and as Senator Kristensen said, if somebody really gets in a bind and can persuade 29 members that what he or she wants to offer in excess of 8 is important, then those 29 will join with that 30th person to suspend the rule, which I don't think will ever happen. So I'm strongly...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in favor of this rule change, and the only reason I'm speaking at all this morning on it is because my good friend Senator Crosby stood up and placed a dead cat on the line.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Kristensen, please.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, and I don't intend to take a whole lot of more time with this because this is not, obviously, the most weighty issue that we are going to deal with, and it's one way to do that. Senator Chambers, I might take a little issue. If somebody is in a bind and they have good cause, I think the body has been generally collegial and would vote to suspend the rules to do that. The trouble is that at the end of a session when that may come up, obviously, there's going to be lots of other things going on and time may be a factor. But I would hope that we would look at this as one way of trying to take care of the resolution issue. I do think the second part coming goes hand in hand. The reason that I went to eight and not be unlimited is that if we're going to pass some of these without having debate, I don't want somebody to introduce 50 or 60 of them, plug the Journal. We never really get to see them on the floor and they slip by and all of a sudden en masse you've got a lot of these resolutions running around. So that's the reason for the limitation on number and would hope that the body would see fit to adopt this. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. There are no other lights on. Senator Hudkins, to close on this rule change, please.
