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So in an effort to try to allow the debate to focus on the more critical, controversial, perhaps the most important parts of the bill, a structured debate rule was enacted so that we could focus our precious time on the important parts of the bill. Now that does have a certain chilling effect on filibustering because the body is usually interested in debating these substantive parts and so the debate focuses on substance if you get into that kind of a structure. This rule was first enacted last year after several hours of debate, as I recall, and the Rules Committee worked on it during that time of debate and overnight, and came back with this and the body adopted it. I'm not standing here to say that my feet are in concrete with respect to this rule. We didn't use it last year. There wasn't an occasion where it appeared to be needed. Maybe it won't be used this year. I don't know. But what I would like to do before we summarily take this out of the rules is to have some further discussion with the new Rules Committee that's just been appointed by this body, and with the Chair of the Rules Committee, and perhaps with Senator Chambers and anyone else who has strong feelings about it, and come back to this body with either a recommendation to scrap this rule entirely or to amend this rule. And I think that would take more...a little bit more study and time than we're going to have today. So I'm, when I can, I'm going to ask Senator Chambers to consider,...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute, please.

SENATOR BROMM: ...if he were assured by the Speaker, and I've already heard his answer, but if he were assured by the Speaker that this matter could get discussed and get on the agenda, whether he would withdraw the motion with the agreement that it could be brought back in 30 days or 2 weeks or whatever is a reasonable time so that we can have a little bit more consideration and discussion on it. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Wickersham, to speak to the Chambers amendment, please.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Thank you, Mr. President. I am in a position here to agree with Senator Chambers. I don't keep track of how often that occurs. It may not be as often as Senator Chambers wishes, but I agree with Senator Chambers that
