Prudent Investor Act as it is for almost every other trustee in state law. Secondly, it says when, in the rare circumstance, the beneficiary dies before the declarant, before the transferor, we are going to remove from the statute special nonuniform suggestions that were put in pursuant to the State Bar Association a year ago. We had members of our State Bar Association who said, you know, when we do that, we're going to transfer this property a second time, we need to have two witnesses, we need to have a notary, we need to make this trans...we need to have a very highly technical document for the transfer of this property. There was one state that did this, North Carolina, and our Bar Association members said, let's follow the North Carolina rule rather than the uniform rule. In the intervening year, the State Bar Association has changed its mind and they said, wait a second, the whole goal was to get a simple, nonlawyer kind of trust, and we've now created this little nonuniform provision that has a higher level of legal detail, suspenders and belts, if you will, than all the rest of the document; upon reflection, we should go back to the Uniform State Law Commissioner's model language; we should drop these special provisions that we put in. And you'll see in the committee report that the State Bar Association came in in support of this bill because they wanted to return to a more simple use of the custodial trust. Two things the bill does. It returns us to the uniform language suggested by the Uniform State Law Commissioners for this act and, secondly, tells the trustee what the standard approach for them should be as a fiduciary and it names it as the Uniform Prudent Investor Act, an act we've previously passed and authorized for trustees, generally, both in the charitable area and in the private sector. I would ask for the adoption of the bill and advancement to E & R Initial. Thank you.
