isn't the point. The point is this is a new commission going into the statute. I would guess every one of you at some time or another in your campaign said, no, I don't want any new commissions, I don't...I want government to be smaller, we've got to keep this from...these things from spreading. Here's a new commission. And if you look over all the bills that are in this time, there is more than one new commission. Look at the book that you received recently from our research arm and listing all the commissions that we have in this state. There's only \$75,000 of General Funds in this because it is a funnel to expend the federal funds, but, remember, federal funds are your taxes too. Those don't come from some basement in Washington. They're your money coming back. But my only point in this is that I hope you're paying attention, because when you go back to your constituents all I see in...the people that came in for it are, indeed, involved in it, but I don't see any person maybe who is a volunteer for an organization coming in, say we really need this. Again, I say I'm not going to tell you not to vote for it. I'll probably vote for it because it's there, it's...it's offering a service. But every year, almost every year, and four years ago when I went into Appropriations I said to that committee if any one of you introduces a bill to get rid of the three advocacy commissions we have I will personally come around and do something really bad to you, because most of the commissions do offer a service. They perform a service. There's a lot of your constituents and my constituents involved in all of them, in this one, but don't go back to your district and say, I'm going to cut back on government. It's virtually impossible to stop any of this kind of thing. And you can't go back and get rid of most of those 300 commissions. They are there. A lot of them have been there for a long time. So you can't...so I guess what I'm telling you is just pay attention and be ready if some constituent stands up and says, why don't you get rid of all those commissions? This morning, you are getting a really good example of why you cannot and why it is so difficult not to start a new one. So, Senator Schimek, as I said, I'm not telling anybody not to vote, but I want them to understand what they're doing and have that feeling that you are, this morning, starting another little group of people. It is a small group of people, actually, who works in the actual administration of this. Ten years from now I would guess that \$75,000 of General Funds will have multiplied. I won't predict
