worthy. This one here is a very worthy endeavor, and it's very effective up in my area. But, however, as it says in the bill, that the members would be eligible for reimbursement of actual and necessary expenses, and the commission would be given the authority to hire an executive director and staff and undertake programs to encourage volunteers in local community, I believe that's probably happening now. And I believe in...total volunteerism is different in these different areas. We have the Alzheimer's Association, we have the ARC, we have different ones like that, that they are not an agency of the government, and they are not funded. And, like I say, although I believe this is very worthy and I have signed onto Senator Schimek's bill, finally, as far as reviewing the 300 different boards and commissions we have in the state of Nebraska to see if they are effective, where they will be checked every couple years to see if they are fulfilling the intent that they were created, I do believe that we have too many boards and commissions in the state, and each and every one of them adds something to our budget. So, therefore, I do believe we have to check the ones we have; the ones aren't necessary, we probably should get rid of. We should be very careful about creating new ones. And what I might do, Senator Schimek, if you're here, if you might like to make a trade, I might like to trade you maybe one for one hundred, or something like that, if you'd like to do something like that. But, no, in all seriousness, I am against creating new boards and commissions, especially if they're effective without being placed under statute. Thank you.
