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me whether or not this commission presently has a director or someone who's basically in charge or not. Do they have a director now?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, they do.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay. And is there any...is there any reasonable certainty that if we don't do this bill, that this commission will go out of existence and not receive the federal monies, or do you anticipate, if this bill will get bogged down or not make it, do you anticipate that they would be able to continue to try to function the way they have been? Do you have a feeling on that? I'm asking your best judgment on that, I guess.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I appreciate the question, Senator. Actually, these are all matching funds that we're talking about here. So if there were a shortfall in either state funding or in-kind funding, then there would not be as many federal funds that would come into the state as a result of that.

SENATOR BROMM: Other than the in-kind contributions of the state that you mentioned and Senator Raikes mentioned, like office and some of those kinds of things, has the state put in any of the matching funds up to this point?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Not that I'm aware of, but I'd like to check on that,...

SENATOR BROMM: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...to make certain that I have my facts straight on that.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay. Okay, thank you very much, Senator Schimek. I thank those senators who have risen and either provided information or asked questions. And I also thank Senator Schimek for being candid. And really, I think, it's good that she brought the bill. I guess for my part, I am interested in this commission or this activity continuing. I think it's a great activity, and I wouldn't want to see it stopped, as long as it can continue. But I share the
