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you want to go in there and purchase something, that person, you charge it. You charge it.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: But now you've got a credit card in your hand, you've got a credit card, and you...and, I mean, you've set up a charge account with this place, but you can use that credit card other places.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Right. Instead of charging it, you're paying for it with a credit card.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: You're paying for it with a credit card and, you know, before it had to go through a process, a bidding process, let's say for a computer.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Doesn't change that any.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: It doesn't say that. It doesn't say that, and that's my concern.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Well, you're charging, I mean...

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Like some of my colleagues, Senator Chambers and Senator Matzke have said, members of the Legislature, this, the wording in this is not the kind of a bill we want to pass out of this Legislature, and I would recommend that we not advance this bill today, and hold it until it is more precise in what it has to say and what it's going to do.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, Senator Tyson and Senator Schimek argue learnedly and well. I just don't have that level of comfort, to use a cliché, that would allow me to support a bill like this. I acknowledged, in the beginning, that because of other activities in which I was engaged, there are gaps in my understanding of just what this bill does. But there is no way that I'm going to vote in favor of it as long as I have the questions that I do have. It is too easy for people to stand on this floor and say if a person suffers humiliation at the hands of somebody else,
