don't worry about it because they're not humiliated. Those who experience it do consider it and take it seriously. This is why, in a body such as this, there's a necessity that people from all walks of life, and, if possible, every shade and gradation of experience should be here, because many people live their life in a milieu where the problems of ordinary people never are encountered by them, so to them those problems don't exist. And they say, so what, if you're handled by a merchant in such a way that everybody thinks you're a criminal, you're not, are you? What do you care what the person thinks? Well, you know what? Because there are very important big shot people, not blue collar, frayed collar or no collar people, but big shot people who had things said about them that they didn't like, that we put into the law provisions relative to libel, where if you write certain things, you can be held accountable and made to pay, and all you used are words. Slander, where you simply speak certain things, and you can be made to pay. If you're a big enough shot and your reputation is harmed, see reputations mean something to big shots. Reputations, and nothing else, is of value when we talk about the helpless, the scorned, the rejected, the outcast, who, nevertheless, do have their feelings, who may not be considered by anybody else, but they have heartstrings that can be twanged the wrong way. They have feelings that can be hurt, and every time something comes across this floor, which, in my opinion, offers the chance for people to be humiliated or embarrassed, I'm going to say something about it. I can understand the hardheartedness of Baron Tyson. That's something that I haven't been able to work out of him yet, but I'm working on it. It just takes a little time and it takes patience. But in looking at this transaction, how many of you all would like to walk into one of these big mall stores and present the card, and you're standing there, maybe you even show a little bit of arrogance because you've got one of these cards. And they say, uh-uh, buddy, this card is no good. Security, security! And here they come and they put the grabs on you. Then you just smile and say, well, yeah, this is a part of democracy and it doesn't make any difference. Everybody is doing their job. So I don't even care, take me into the back room. Put handcuffs on me, pepper spray me and take me to jail, that's all right.
