SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Mr. President, members of the body, I really feel that Senator Beutler has said it all. Senator Chambers also came up with exactly the same objection to the archaic language. I mentioned the other day when we were talking about this bill on General File that some of the language in this particular section of the law dates back to territorial legislative days--1867, 1870. I think Senator Beutler's amendment is well taken and I urge that it be adopted, and I'll relinquish the rest of the time. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, not only do I support Senator Beutler's amendment, but I want to compliment him for having done something which I didn't see the need to do until I got here this morning. So, with the adoption of his amendment, I'm going to have mine withdrawn, because his will cover that territory. Senator Beutler, thank you, and I want to be collegial at this point in the session when I can because, knowing your inclinations and predilections, I'm not sure that we're going to be (laugh) on the same wavelength as we are this morning.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I think the amendment is understood, Mr. Speaker, so I would say nothing further except to indicate to Senator Chambers that I'm a changed person this year and promise to be much more collegial and...except perhaps with regard to some of his bad ideas.

(Laughter)

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. The motion before us is the amendment to LB 128. Those in favor vote aye; those opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 36 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Beutler's amendment.
