SENATOR HARTNETT: ...you know, in where...

SENATOR LANDIS: Yeah, and when we use the word "foreign" we don't mean alien. Let me describe the difference between those two.

SENATOR HARTNETT: (Laugh) Don't mean to...

SENATOR LANDIS: A foreign company is a company that is domiciled in another state...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Oh.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...in America. An alien company would be a company from another country. These are companies that another state is responsible for. What we say is this. We will examine our own domestic companies, companies that originate and are domiciled in Nebraska.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Um-hum.

SENATOR LANDIS: We will, under normal circumstances, allow other states to examine their home companies. However, if a company is doing business in this state and we have reason to be suspicious, we can call them in...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...and ask them questions. We'll do it when we fear that there's something up and we've got some kind of a lead. But, in the normal course of examination, that's for another state to do. So it's a tool for any company who's writing business in the state, but our regular course of action is with the companies domiciled here, called domestic companies, and the regular course of action is for the foreign state to regulate the foreign company unless we know that something's up. Then this tool exists.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay. Thank you very much, Senator Landis.
