

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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January 28, 1999 LB 260, 326

SENATOR LANDIS: Let me see, I think there's a provision I was going to mention, because there are multiple provisions in this one. Oh, yes, sponsors of continuing education courses will have to file with the director. Currently, when a sponsor offers a class, it's supposed to be eight hours long and they let them go after four hours, which occurs. Great afternoon, tee time about one o'clock, let's wrap this up with a quick summary and get out of here. The only way to discipline that is to make sure that the person who's signed up for the class doesn't get credit for the class. They've paid for it. They were there. They sat there and the sponsor let them go early. This allows the sponsor to be disciplined rather than simply allowing the person who gets the service to lose the credit for those hours and express some discipline in an area that deserves discipline for the people who are, in fact, perpetuating the act which needs to be disciplined, which is the sponsor themselves, and that's also in the bill. I'd ask for the advancement of LB 260.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Landis. You've heard the closing. The question is the advancement of LB 260 to E & R. All in favor vote aye; opposed no. Record, please.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of 260.

SENATOR CROSBY: LB 260 advances. LB 326.

CLERK: (LB) 326, by Senator Landis. (Read title.) Bill was introduced on January 12 of this year, referred to the Banking Committee for public hearing, advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending, Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Landis, you're recognized to open on the bill.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature. I want to tell you that these bills are under my name. These are the kinds of bills that would normally be committee bills, but I'm sensitive to the fact that committee bills are usually very rarely examined by the members of the
