want to blur the line and obliterate it. There are two genders, at least, but there are others in between; people who are both genders, and people who are partly one and partly the other, and it's hard to distinguish by visual means exactly which gender that person belongs to. So there are psychological and other matters, principles that come into play. But when we are talking about the fundamental document of this government, I see nothing wrong, and, in fact, I see an obligation to recognize that there are two genders. Were I a woman, which I think whoever...whatever powers there be that I'm not because of how much I appreciate women, and if I were a woman myself, I could not do that. But if I were a woman, I would not always want to be subsumed, to use that legal term, into the masculine in every respect. If you belong to the favored group, you have no problem saying that every point of reference should begin with me and nobody should mind that because you are the one being elevated, you are the paradigm, you are the example, you are the epitome, you are the apex, you are the beginning, the end, the alpha, the omega, and all the rest of that. But to prove that the men who take those positions don't really mean it, challenge their favored position in the most insignificant, innocuous way, and they scream like a pig with a nose under the gate. They want to say, oh, you're trying to be, what is that term, what is that term they use about being correct, politically correct. I try to remember it because they call computers PCs and that is how I remember it, politically correct, they holler that whenever their territory and their domain is encroached upon. What is their domain? The entire universe, everything. If they decide, in their arrogance, they are going to grant by way of privilege a bit of recognition to a female, a bit of recognition to somebody who is not white male, then that is supposed to make them very compassionate, very benevolent, and the recipients of their largess should fall down on their knees, raise their hands, and cry...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...hosanna. Not so with me. This is a time when recognition of differences must be made, especially when the failure to recognize those differences result in discrimination and unfair treatment. Nobody on this floor can say that women occupy an equal status to men in this society,
