too, to read, and that's not what I envision that you are going to just go put an "or she" in all this, because that doesn't work well either. What works, in many cases, is to remove the reference to the pronoun, that the constitution doesn't matter if you're male or female, or in between, or both; what matters is the rights that the individual has. And for many of those rights, the reference to that can be done by a "their", can be done with no reference at all, and if you look through the constitution, I don't envision putting mankind, womankind, "shedom," "hedom" or whatever. What I do recognize is the fact that if you were going to start over, and you were going to write a constitution that was correct and read well, you would not make the references to "he". You would make them inclusive references. The constitution doesn't care what you are, it cares the fact that you're an individual and you have rights, and what those rights are, and procedurally how they are carried out. Now that would be the charge that I would hope the Secretary of State would have the opportunity to do, not to make any substantive changes in terms of giving or denying a right based on gender, but merely make the document read so it isn't as offensive, the fact it does read in a neutral capacity without reference to gender at all because there shouldn't be a reference to it. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, those who engage in psychological warfare, those who engage in brainwashing know that language is every thing. Labeling is extremely important. Once you can attach a label to an individual or to a group, all of the baggage which that label carries automatically comes tumbling down on that individual or group who carries the label. So, in this society, how we designate a person means a tremendous amount. The constitution should designate females as females, not as males. But I'd like to ask Senator Tyson a question, if he is on the floor.
