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don't even understand why this thing was introduced because according to the Bert Lance (phonetic) law, which is, if it's not badly broken, don't even attempt to fix it, there's nothing the matter with the way things are. But, if this bothers people, let's not do things by halves. Do you realize that we could go and we could start with, where should we start? The meadow at Runnymede, that's where we can start, the Magna Carta. What were those people thinking about talking with Prince John? All of those constructions are in the male gender. Of course, the Magna Carta is written in Latin, which has specific genders for each word. The thing of it is here that nothing is broken and we are using...we are going from good English usage to poor English usage. We are fixing something that isn't broken. Now does this have any significance? Well, a year or so ago, we put something up for the vote of the people that said that rights that are very clearly contained in the Constitution of the United States should be put into the Constitution of the State of Nebraska. That was okay. What damage could that do? Well, it set up a whole series of actions that stopped the carrying out of a punishment decreed by a number of courts over a period of 18 years. Does it make any difference? Probably not in the long run. But it cost the taxpayers of Nebraska, again, more money to do the thing that we had thought had been done, and a man who is a multiple murderer 18 years ago is still on death row. Now I have to tell you that I put that in deliberately because Senator Chambers, is your time...Madam, does Senator Chambers have any more time on this? Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: No.

SENATOR TYSON: Good. Senator Chambers, will have to sit there at his desk and writhe knowing that he has...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...a comeback to that. Again, I tell you there is nothing to be done here except to make a good English usage a poor English usage, and you may vote for what you want. I will vote for the English language. It is changing constantly, but this is a change that we don't need. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Thompson.
