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issue, and the other one is going to be the dollar amount. One solution, probably, is to advance this bill at this point with the understanding come May it may not fit very well with our budget. We have a lots of ways to go in our budget before we know exactly where we're going to be. In fact, the first status will be around the first of March, probably just a little bit before that. It is not in the Governor's budget, as you know, as has been mentioned, and I think we probably ought to understand a little bit the importance of the guard. I would hope that Senator Janssen would make a little more comment on that. I would have one question, Senator Janssen.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Could you...could you leave your...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: If I recall this right, we went through this three or four years ago when we did...or I guess it has been longer than that, it was '92, as to pulling back on some of the tuition credits. As I recall, they have to complete that. There is pretty good oversight into this program as to whether someone could enroll in a course, get the tuition, and then drop it. Do you recall the details of that program so that we are assured that people will stay in their class through the whole program? Can you recall that?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, yes, if they don't stay in, their tuition drops, stops, of course, and the enlistment is for another two years on by their graduation, so that they just don't enroll in this, get their education and say, adios, I'm done. No, they have to finish another two years after they...or their enlistment runs for two years after they graduate.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, so there is pretty good safeguards in it that they will not get halfway through the course and drop it, so forth, the tuition reimbursement come. It is a reimbursement, it is so...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, right, if you're not there...
