they will have A bills on this and A bills on that. Well, in this particular Governor's budget, it has gotten to the point where there is \$2 million for the 49 A bills that you and I might have this whole session. And you know he's got a budget that's at about 3 percent in each of the next two years, so I don't think we're going to spend something more than that. We will have a hard time spending less than that. We are probably going to spend very close to what the totality of his budget is, and there is \$2 million for all 49 of us to spend on A bills. This bill is an A bill that will sit there until Final Reading, if we advance it. It takes up half of that, one million of the two million. I think it's probably a good cause, too, but I'm suggesting to you that there are going to be, as the veterans here know, a lot more A bills that are going to represent a lot of good causes, and you're going to want to vote for. And it seems to me, looking ahead at all these variety of topics, and, of course, I make subjective judgments, we all are somewhat subjective about our judgments, but I think the consensus is going to be that we don't want half the money, half the new money we can spend to be spent on this. We're going to be choos...there's probably 20 to 30 million dollars worth of new A bills out there, many of them which are topics that are of interest to all of you. So I'm suggesting that we need to scale back this one and perhaps take a slower approach. Maybe we could do 60 percent this year, and if it is still underrated, or maybe we could tie it to some kind of figure, if somebody wants to try to work out a more sophisticated mechanism relating to whether they are at full strength or not. But if we don't do that, I would hope we at least would start at some lower percentage, maybe changing from 50 to 60 percent. Instead of jumping all the way back to where we were before and flip-flopping back and forth all the way, maybe we need to take a more measured approach and see what happens with 60 percent; if we're still underfunded, go to 70 percent. But I would like Senator Janssen to address two more questions in addition to the huge pull that this is on the money that's there for A bills. One is, what does full strength mean? And do we always want the guard to be the same size?
