definitely say, Senator Janssen, that I support the National Guard and the intent of the bill. For those of us who have ever lived in communities when the National Guard has been mobilized, like it was during the aftermath of the tornado, we're extremely appreciative of what the guard does and the tremendous duty that they provide for us. So I'm not, in any way, attempting to jeopardize the bill. My goal is to make sure that this is an inclusive bill and not exclusive in that it is going to limit colleges because of the accrediting language. And on line 5 of your bill, any member of the Nebraska National Guard who enrolls in any state-supported university, college, or community college or any independent not-for-profit, regionally accredited college shall be entitled to a credit of...and then it goes on. I would like to ask Senator Janssen a question.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Janssen, will you yield for a question?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Senator Janssen, would the wording in the bill as it is written now, with the regionally accredited college, remove Grand Island College, the Bryan School of Nursing, and Nebraska Christian College from being able to take advantage of the tuition credit should any of these people decide to go there?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, I believe it would.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Were you...were you aware of this? Is there a way we can work with this?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Why, yeah, I'll sit down and visit with you about it. I have to check it a little bit further, though, before I can do that.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Okay.

SENATOR JANSSEN: I can't say yes or no right now.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Let me go back to the issue of the regionally versus the nationally accrediting agency. The Grand Island College, and I won't speak to the Bryan School of Nursing
