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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Could or could not?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Could.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well, they are. I mean they explicitly are.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Based on this bill passing.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, what could they do as political subdivisions?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: They can hold a county fair and carry on those activities.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, here's...maybe I ought to...ought to ask it this way. For this category of political subdivision, are there itemized restrictions in the statute as to what they can do?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Or would they.... Okay. You don't have to read them off, but they're not a political subdivision like a city or a county or a school district.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well, in the generic sense, appointed county fair boards exist and, yes, they're a division of a county, so they're not a separate political subdivision.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if we had a general statute that related to political subdivisions, it would apply to these that we're talking about today if this bill would pass.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: It...yes, it will apply to the elected county fair boards.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But not the appointed ones.
